













Initially 0,16 mol  $H_2(g)$  and excess S(s) are sealed in a 2 dm<sup>3</sup> container and the system is allowed to reach equilibrium at 90 °C.

An exact amount of  $Pb(NO_3)_2$  solution is now added to the container so that ALL the  $H_2S(g)$  present in the container at EQUILIBRIUM is converted to PbS(s) according to the following balanced equation:

$$Pb(NO_3)_2(aq) + H_2S(g) \rightarrow PbS(s) + 2HNO_3(aq)$$

The mass of the PbS precipitate is 2,39 g.

  - 7.1.1 Define the term *hydrolysis* of a salt. (2)
  - 7.1.2 Will the pH of the solution be GREATER THAN, SMALLER THAN or EQUAL TO 7? Write a relevant equation to support your answer. (3)
- 7.2 A sulphuric acid solution is prepared by dissolving 7,35 g of  $H_2SO_4(\ell)$  in 500 cm<sup>3</sup> of water.
  - 7.2.1 Calculate the number of moles of  $H_2SO_4$  present in this solution. (2)

Sodium hydroxide (NaOH) pellets are added to the 500 cm<sup>3</sup> H<sub>2</sub>SO<sub>4</sub> solution.

The balanced equation for the reaction is:


$$H_2SO_4(aq) + 2NaOH(s) \rightarrow Na_2SO_4(aq) + 2H_2O(l)$$






