QUESTION 1

- Name the piece you will be referring to and give the date it was choreographed. (1)
- Give a brief synopsis of the piece. (4)
- Describe how the choreographer uses the craft of choreography to make comments about an issue of the time. Refer to costume, lighting, music and movement.
