


FIGURE 3.1: DELTA-STAR-CONNECTED TRANSFORMER






FIGURE 5.1: PARALLEL RLC CIRCUIT




FIGURE 6.1: PLC SCAN CYCLE




FIGURE 6.2: CONTROL CIRCUIT OF A SEQUENCE STARTER




FIGURE 7.1: OP-AMP CIRCUIT





FIGURE 7.2: INVERTING SCHMIDT TRIGGER




FIGURE 7.4: TANK CIRCUIT OF A HARTLEY OSCILLATOR





FIGURE 7.5: OP-AMP CIRCUIT




FIGURE 7.7: BI-STABLE MULTIVIBRATOR
